Sun., April 5 at 3 p.m.

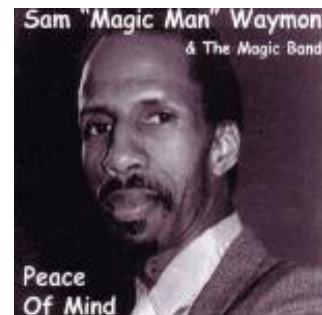
